When people are scared, you are our refuge.


When people are mourning, you are our refuge.

Lectionary Reflection 9 May John 15:9-17

There's a very strong and striking claim here in v. 9 when you think about it: that the relationship between God and Jesus is equivalent to the relationship between Jesus and his disciples, and because we are also disciples, that includes us! We can see how that might be the case in some ways – God shares his divine nature with Jesus, we share our human nature with Jesus; God is present in Jesus in some way, Jesus is present in us in some way. Still, it's a bit mindboggling when we see how close is the relationship between God and his 'only son', to think that Jesus is that close to us.

But of course, it is the strength of our connection with Jesus that allows us to continue this cascade of love and meet the very demanding ask that we love others as he has loved us. Self-giving is the hallmark of divine love – does our loving stand up to scrutiny?
